August 13th 2022. Gloucestershire Stone Stile Project - Jayne Tovey.



Stone stiles are a characteristic of the Cotswold landscape of Gloucestershire, with many stiles over 200 years old. For centuries stone stiles have allowed pedestrian access across the countryside and as such indicated ancient pathways which predate land enclosure, and point to where farmsteads, barns and villages, long since vanished, existed. Despite their historic value there is no comprehensive record of stone stiles in our ancient county of Gloucestershire.

Jayne has been instrumental in documenting over 500 of the 800 known. It's been a journey of exploration, not just of the landscape but that of her own spiritual journey and introduction to dowsing.

Book Review by Lawrence Wadsworth

A Fairy Tale – The Green Snake & The Beautiful Lily, by Johann Wolfgang von Goethe



This book contains the original translation of Wolfgang von Goethe's Fairy Tale by Thomas Carlyle in 1832. It also includes a modern abridged version with a full interpretation by Rory Duff, who many of you will remember gave a talk to our Dowsing Group on a full classification of Leylines, Earth Energies and Nodes back in March 2019. At that time Rory Duff ran the Bristol Dowsing Society.

Goethe during his life recognised that freedom cannot be imposed from outside but must arise from within each

person. He therefore set about writing a Fairy Tale to show via "imaginative pictures" the way a human soul could be set free giving rise to a new and free human community.

The tale is essentially one of transformation, and is based on the power of love and self sacrifice. It is a typical Fairy Tale and revolves around the crossing and bridging of a river, which represents the divide between the land of spirit, and the land of the senses (our conscious life). The main characters are the Ferryman, who can only take passengers in one direction across the river; Will 'O Wisps, two gentlemen made of flames and light; The Green Snake who lives in a chasm with access to an underground chamber; The melancholy Prince who loves the beautiful Lily, but cannot approach her as her touch brings death to all things; The old man with a lamp that can only give out light when another light is present; The Four Kings, one of gold, one of silver, one of bronze, and one a mixture of all three; The wife of the old man who falls for the flattery of the Will 'O Wisps; The Giant with a huge shadow, and finally the Beautiful Lily who loves the Prince, but has to live with the terrible burden that her touch can bring death to all things.

You will have to read the book to see how all the characters play their part in the story, and relate to one another, and of course to find out how the story ends.

This is an endearing and enjoyable story in its own right, despite the deeper meanings, which everyone will no doubt interpret differently in accordance with their own belief system. Therefore it is helpful to have Rory Duff's own interpretation to hand to help stimulate one owns understanding, and no doubt generate new ones.
